


University of Pittsburgh Medical Center: Children's Hospital Off-Campus Parking

In May of 2009, University of Pittsburgh Medical Center (UPMC) will open its new Children's Hospital unit, and Independence Excavating will have been a part of that project's success by helping to provide a vital need... parking! In July of this year, our crews began demolition contract of a 450,000 square foot warehouse building to start the site preparation for a new 15-acre parking lot that will be used for off-campus parking at the new facility. The project was let on an aggressive schedule with stringent milestones and our demolition division rose to the challenge to beat the deadline — preparing the site ahead of schedule. Beyond the schedule challenges, our crews processed nearly 40,000 tons of concrete to be used as recycled aggregate materials on the development of the site, and addressed other structures encountered below grade without holding up the base schedule.

Nearing the completion of the demolition project, Independence was awarded the sitework project including earthwork, utilities, pavement, electrical, curbing and landscaping to complete the final design.



Our crews dove right into the earthwork and utility installation in close coordination with UPMC, Oxford Development, and the design staff (Gateway Engineers and HF Lenz). This project also has its schedule challenges with pavement installation that will be very sensitive to the looming winter season, as well as an aggressive coordination of electrical and

curbing to ensure that we are not affected by seasonal weather.

The close coordination and tireless efforts of UPMC, Oxford, designers, our subcontractors and our own crews promises to bring a great product to UPMC, as well as the greater Pittsburgh area.





Independence teams with West Creek Preservation

On July 11, 2008, Mayor Greg Kurtz of Independence presided over ceremonies that signaled the creation of a new nature park within the municipality. The project commenced with the demolition of a 115,000 square foot warehouse located on Granger Road on property was held by The Trust for Public Land and purchased by the West Creek Preservation Society. The site is located where the West Creek joins the Cuyahoga River in an area prone to flooding. Once complete, the work performed by Independence Excavating will eliminate the flooding and bring the area back to its original, natural state, to be enjoyed by area families.

In five weeks, we managed to demolish the building; removing approximately 350 tons of scrap, 1,400 linear feet of poured in-place wall,



500 linear feet block footings, 1,700 yards of concrete floor and column pads, 1,400 yards of asphalt, and 1,200 yards of debris.

A special thanks to The Trust for Public Land, West Creek Preservation Society and the engineers and building department of the City of Independence for allowing us to be involved in this project. Equipment operators Steve Doherty, Paul Guillito, George Bihun, and laborer Sergio Mauretti did a great job, as well as our Teamsters whose hard work made this project a success in a short period of time.

CURRENT PROJECT

Allegheny Power Substation Spill Responses Project

In May of 2008, Independence Excavating crews started a challenging project as part of the team of GAI Consultants in Pittsburgh on a project for Allegheny Power. This project will address concerns at various electrical substations in Pennsylvania. West Virginia. and Maryland. For this project, we have assigned mobile crews that travel those states to install containment systems around oil-filled equipment in live substations to protect the area in the event of a system failure. The crews of four men are stationed at each location for approximately two weeks installing the systems designed by GAI, in coordination with Allegheny Power inspectors, before moving to the next sub-station in line.

Independence will be working with three crews through 2008 and into 2009 on a site-by-site basis with GAI, often in remote areas of each state. Each site has its own unique design and challenges that also require explicit attention to design detail as well as heightened safety consciousness while working around high and live power. The cooperative and enthusiastic efforts of our teams, our suppliers, GAI, and Allegheny Power have maintained this project at a formidable pace, while ultimately providing a quality product to help Allegheny Power





protect the environment. Independence Excavating is proud to be a part of the team to promote this project's success.
