We overcame many challenges and finished the project on schedule.

Pittsburgh, if you're a Browns fan, was branded the "pitts of hell" but we found it to be quite the contrary. The people outside the project were very friendly. President's Message

BETTER METHODS = SUCCESS

A while ago someone asked me to what I attribute the success of our company. I thought for a moment and replied, "just plain hard work". My father instilled in us a great work ethic and an enthusiasm to work as efficiently as possible. Later, I thought of how he started his construction business and how it led to Independence Excavating and all of our related companies. In the last issue of our newsletter you saw a timeline which I will try to define in more detail.

In 1940, the year I was born, my father Sam started a construction company called Better Methods Construction Company. Obviously by the name, you can understand that he was always looking for a way to improve on ways of doing a construction job and a way to pass the savings onto the customer. He built a reputation based on honesty and innovative ideas.

In 1948, he bought a Minneapolis Moline tractor with a Lull frontend loader attachment. He devised a pipe boom off the bucket to place brick, block, and mortar on top of scaffolding for the bricklayers. At present, Lull is one of the largest manufacturers of rough terrain telehandler machines...maybe they got the idea from him! He also had an idea of how to encourage me to get better grades in high school. Once when I brought my report card home he suggested I put "side boards" on the wheelbarrows because with those grades I would never amount to anything. Again, he was looking ahead because we now have side boards on most of our fleet of 35 and 40-ton off-road trucks!

In 1950, he purchased a 16-acre farm on Route 21 in Independence. We were a little older then so he changed the name of the company to Sam DiGeronimo & Sons. Every once in a while I wonder if we should have kept that name in honor of him. We had a John Deere farm tractor and grew various vegetables on the farm.

1988 - Keep our demolition jobs from being interrupted when encountering asbestos.

1991 – Utilize recycling equipment in winter months.

1993 - Total radio communication with our fleet of trucks and equipment.

1999 - Get concrete dumped at our yard.

2000 - Recycle asphalt in place.

2001 - Set 16,000 lf. of 120" pipe, excavate and compact 4,000,000 cyf. of earth.

2003 - Crush slag for ISG Steel Co. (subcontractor to Stein, Inc.)

2003 - Concrete structure

2003 - Crush shale for lightweight aggregate more efficiently.

2004 – Keep our roadways and highways clean.

2004 - Independence Excavating - Pittsburgh, PA.

Result:

Purchase Allis Chalmers track loader - thus Independence Excavating. Income - \$60,000

Independence Recycling, 10 crushing systems.




Later in the fifties, we developed a residential street as an extension of Longano Drive. We ran the construction company from an office in the home on the remaining three and a half acres of property until 1960 when we moved to Old Brecksville Road, then in the mid seventies to our present location on Schaaf Road.

In 1955, I caught the John Deere farm tractor on fire, and what was left of it was traded in on a brand new 1955 Allis Chalmers track loader. This loader is pictured to the right. My father purchased the machine so he could do his own digging and grading, not wanting to depend on others. Again, a "better method". Our brother Don then started doing "side jobs" with this loader and started Independence Excavating. At the time he named the company Independence, obviously because of the city where we lived, and also most of the surrounding suburbs had excavating companies named after the cities; Brecksville, Broadview Hts. and Seven Hills come to mind.

Don passed on in 1971 and from then until the present we continue to try "better methods" to remain competitive and continue the growth of all of the DiGeronimo Companies. The chart (page 2) represents of some of the "better methods" and their result:

Summerset at Frick Park

We have expanded our demolition, earthwork and utility operations to the great city of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. As our permanent operation is being established, we've hired Ed Lynch Jr. to head up this Pittsburgh division as our business development manager and controller of day-to-day activities. Rick Lantz will estimate and project manage what we hope are many future projects in this beautiful city of hills and valleys. As demolition projects are already underway, we currently started a \$5 million project on the southwest side of the city known as Summerset at Frick Park. This public project that we bid to the Urban Development Authority of Pittsburgh calls for rough-grading 50 acres of the site, of which was an old steel slag dump for many years. Also, we will install the infrastructure and master drainage prior to the completion of constructing roads and townhouses on the Sally Pfaff with Summerset Land project. Development Associates Inc. will manage the construction and sales of the elaborate townhouses as well as all final landscaping and facilities.

The project, headed by Charles Miller III of Urban Redevelopment Authority has an extremely fast-paced schedule. We must mass excavate and compact approximately 800,000 cubic yards of soil, broken concrete, and slag to various areas of the project, all to be

completed in less than four months. In between, we will install 8,000 linear feet of pipe and fifty manholes and other structures for the major drainage on the project. Subcontractors and other aspects of the project including asbestos abatement are critical to the completion of this project.

The designer and engineer of record is GAI Consultants headed by senior engineer Jeffrey Parobek. Also GAI's inspection team lead by George Drummer helped us "learn the ropes" working in an unfamiliar city.

Our lead superintendent is Chuck Begue who brings many years of experience to a project of this magnitude. Also, our new Pittsburgh connection and sewer foreman

Scott Rogers has been a major help in this beginning phase. Many thanks to all of our new employees from the Pittsburgh area (operators, laborers and mechanics) for their efforts thus far. A big thanks to Jeff Rudolph, Rick Evans, and Tommy Thompson for working away from home and being instrumental on this major construction project.

We performed the excavation on the Liberty exit of I-579 at the Civic Center for the Ruhlin Company. Hauling off the project was a major challenge due to traffic. Next, we entered into a contract with Dick Corporation to excavate the south portal of the PAT tunnel from Mt. Lebanon to downtown Pittsburgh. We also performed the concrete removal and excavation of the I-376 expressway with Dick Corp. We enjoyed our 30-month stay, but local competition had a huge advantage on us causing us to be non-competitive.

So we left town and went back to Ohio. Now, 21 years later, we'll try it again. The next generation, namely Rick and Rob DiGeronimo, are focusing their talents on re-establishing another "go" in Pittsburgh.

Safety

House Bill 52 – Highway Work Zone Safety

On June 1, Governor Robert Taft signed into law House Bill 52. The bill increases penalties and guarantees jail time for motorist who seriously injure or kill someone in a highway work zone. A year and a half of hard work by the Ohio Contractors Association and many others has finally paid off for the construction industry.

The new law now makes it a first-degree misdemeanor for injuring or killing anyone, worker or motorist, in a work zone. The penalties are a minimum 15 days in jail with the potential of six months, up to \$1,000 in fines and loss of a driver's license for one to five years for killing a worker while speeding in a work zone. For seriously

injuring a worker the jail time is a guaranteed seven days with the possibility of up to \$1,000 in fines and the one to five years license suspension. These are a few of the highlights of the new law. The new law also by-passed the usual three-month waiting period for a bill to become a law and took effect immediately on the signing date. This allows it to be in place for this year's construction season. One of the last requirements of the new law mandates the ODOT must post warning signs in work zones, over five days in duration, advising motorist of the new penalties.

The hope is that with the strength of the new law and the mandated signage, motorist will be deterred from speeding through our



work zones. We all need to do our part by telling friends and family about the new law and the serious consequences that will occur if they have an accident in a work zone that kills or injures someone.


